Course Description

Psychological principles drawn from a variety of subdisciplines (e.g., social, clinical, cognitive) will be surveyed in terms of their relevance and application to the legal system. Topics may include jury selection and decision-making, eyewitness testimony, insanity defense, competency assessment, risk assessment, and police psychology.

Course Goals and Learning Outcomes

This course is a general overview of psychology and law. The goal is to provide you with introductory information and a working vocabulary about psychological concepts and principles as they pertain to phenomena encountered in the criminal justice system. This course will look at important research and examine the contemporary methodologies being used in social and forensic psychology. This course is designed to develop the ability to use scientific methods to examine behaviors that occur in a legal context and to lay the foundations for further study in the area of psychology and law.

Disclaimer

The material covered in this class will include topics (e.g., sexual offenses against children) and possibly images or descriptions of crimes that are graphic and disturbing. I encourage you to carefully consider whether you wish to remain in this class, especially if you or someone you are close to has been the victim of a sexual or violent crime.
